- V. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON MINUTES FROM MAY 12, 2023, YOUTH COMMITTEE MEETING Presenter: Anthony Magaro, Committee Chair Upon motion by Leslie Cantu and seconded by Ben Peavy, the Committee unanimously approved the minutes from May 12, 2023, Youth Committee meeting.

VI. YOUTH UPDATES (DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION) Presenter: Sandra Rodriguez, Youth Program Specialist

- a. Youth Performance Briefing Presented by: Gabriela Ore, Programs Manager
 - Youth participation and services provided are on track for meeting and exceeding expectations, therefore, provides for a consistent type of coverage of WIOA elements and related services. The current enrollment for urban in school and out of school youth is 198, which exceeds the goal of 164, and rural in school and out of school youth is 113, which exceeds the goal of 31.
 - 34 youth have been helped with occupational/vocational training, with the goal

being 40. 177 youth entered work experience, with the goal being 140. 808 youth have been assisted with supportive services, with the goal being 209. 30 youth have been assisted with GED educational services, with the goal being 21.

- Chair Anthony Magaro asked how the goals are established because most of the goals have been far exceeded. Gabriela Ore explained that every year a participant number survey is received and depending on the amount allocated to the contract, a calculation is made of the number of participants to be served in both urban and rural areas as well as the key services.
- Ben Peavy commented to make sure the county judges know that these goals are being met and exceeded in the rural areas.
- Active youth participants are 311 and participants are in each of the 13-counties and meeting the 20% target of total participants from rural counties.
- Chair Anthony Magaro would like to know in the future what the challenges are for getting youth enrolled in the rural counties.
- For work experience, 177 participants have been served with a large majority in government and education. The total amount invested in this is \$661,273.
- For support services, transportation, incentives, and clothing are the largest areas of support with a total amount invested of \$91,664.
- Manuel Ugues stated that a concerted effort of public funds are being invested into the communities and to keeping overhead costs low.
- b. Youth Career Pathways Events
 - A youth career event was held on June 29, 2023, in Castroville, TX (Medina County) with an all-industry focus. 59 students, over 41 parents, and 24 employers and community organizations participated. The sponsors were Friendly Stop, Guadalupe Readymix, Pizza Hut, Bush's Chicken!, and Walmart. The savings from this event due to the sponsorship will allow to allocate the remaining funds to the upcoming events in Seguin on September 14, and San Antonio on September 29. This event led to students more likely to attend while school is in session due to transportation, strong community presence willing to sponsor in Medina County, and great interest of solar eclipse events, early start to promoting initiative.
 - An upcoming rural event will take place in New Braunfels, TX (Comal County) on September 23, 2023, from 12pm to 3pm at New Braunfels Food Bank. It will be an all-industry focus with a goal of 300 youth and parents.
 - An upcoming urban event will take place in San Antonio, TX (Bexar County) on September 29, 2023, from 10am to 2pm at CPS Headquarters. It will focus on the oil and gas and engineering industry with a goal of 150 youth.
- c. Student HireAbility Updates

Presented by: Janice Onyejiako, Disability Navigator

- Navigators attended the State Transition Conference from July 16 to July 19 in San Antonio, TX. Discussions included Charting the Course refunding under a different name, Next Steps to independence: Skills and strategies, and A Look at the Future of Transition in Texas.
- Conversations and strategic planning continue for the 2nd Annual Alamo Hire Event on October 12, 2023, at the Data Point Career Center. Planning continues

for the November 2, 2023, Alamo Helping Hands Resource Collaboration Event with Southside First/Women's Unlimited at the South Flores Career Center. Career Exploration Day is being planned in collaboration with Vocational Rehabilitation for January 2024, at the New Braunfels Career Center.

- Chair Anthony Magaro asked how many Navigators there are. Janice Onyejiako stated that there are two serving 84 school districts, not including charter schools.
- d. SEAL Program Updates
 - Presented by: Victoria Rodriguez, Programs Manager
 - SEAL provides on the job training, offers workplace readiness training, and helps build transferable skills and learning opportunities for students with disabilities.
 - 364 participants were enrolled, 221 were placed in job sites, 152 completed 5 weeks of work, \$240,918.82 was earned, and 22,944.50 hours were worked.
 - At the end of August, the program concluded with 53 participating job sites, 184 completed work readiness training, and 4 students were offered permanent positions.
 - A challenge was that work readiness training was optional.
 - Next steps are a participant ceremony on September 23, employer recognition in January 2024, and a program debrief in December.
- e. FY24 Youth Program Goals
 - Complete asset mapping for rural and urban in collaboration with the youth contractor, use sector-based model and 14 elements, and implement strategic partnership development with routine meetings.
 - Enhance P-Tech connections by identifying pipelines, identifying school partners and employers, and creating co-enrollment mechanisms.
 - Create a service delivery model, establish a framework based on board recommendations, identify key elements, and have ongoing communication with youth program partners.
 - An initiative is the SA Rodeo youth event. The goal is to expose incoming 8th graders to the Ag Mechanics industry pathways that is focused on agricultural power and mechanization. It will be held at the Freeman Coliseum Ag-Mechanics building on February 8 25, 2024. The fiscal impact is \$2,000 to reserve a booth with Jobs Ya'll funding.
 - Another initiative is the annular and total eclipse. The goal is to introduce and spark youths' interest in science-based industries. On October 14, 2023, there will be an annular eclipse with the sun being covered except for a "ring of fire". On April 8, 2024, there will be a total eclipse with total darkness for 4 minutes with the temperature dropping until the sun slowly emerges. There is continuous collaboration with SAISD and Kerrville ISD and no fiscal impact.
 - Future initiatives include a January 2024 urban event cohosted with Up Partnership at San Antonio College with a target of 1,000 youth focusing on all industries, January 2024 rural event cohosted with Seguin EDC at Seguin City Coliseum with a target of 800 youth focusing on all industries, April 2024 urban event at Alamo College District with a target of 400 youth focusing on education, finance, and IT industries, September 2024 rural event in Atascosa County with a target of 400 youth focusing on healthcare and non-profits industries.

Additional youth events are being explored with key partners with dates and times to be determined.

Summary: This item is to provide a briefing to the Youth Committee of the Youth Program's performance to-date for FY24.

WSA continues to work with the Youth Contractor, SERCO, as they monitor and process enrollments. WSA maintains ongoing communication with the youth contractor on TWC's performance goal range of meeting performance: 95-105% and to remain withing the allocated budget.

Analysis: The yearly goal for Urban In-School and Out-of-School Youth is 306 and is currently at 15% met with 45 enrolled youth. This is the trending enrollment for the beginning of a new program year. The yearly goal for Rural In-School and Out-of-School Youth is 88 which is currently at 32% met with 28 youth enrolled, again the trending enrollment for the beginning of a new program year. The current total of active WIOA Youth Participants is 73. Services provided in alignment with the 14 elements consist of Occupational/Vocational Training at 36% of measures met, Work Experience at 8% measures met (this increases tremendously in the summer months), and Supportive Services with 73% measures met.



Summary: To provide the Youth Committee with an update on the first two youth events held to kick off the new PY24 and provide the plans and progress on upcoming youth events.

Section 5.5 in the Workforce Commission Initiatives (WCI) Grant Statement of Work requires that WSA utilize TANF grant funds distributed to the workforce area to support the Agency's Jobs Y'all events for middle school, high school, and postsecondary students. The events should invite employers to participate in a relevant way to help students explore career opportunities in their industries. Student participation should encourage exploration of career opportunities including understanding pathways to in-demand careers, networking, internships, and other applied learning opportunities. Parents should also be invited to attend with their children to discuss their special role in career exploration. Events shall be held using the branding of Jobs Y'all and may include Board-specific branding. Boards have the ability to locally determine dates.

For FY2024, WSA will continue to shift from one large event to several smaller, industry focused events, in addition to the cohosting of youth events to reach a higher number of students and leverage resources. This will support the engagement of youth at different locations, including both rural and urban areas, and the targeting of a variety of industries and youth sub-populations. In addition, it will provide youth opportunities to attend multiple events over the course of the year and provide a greater variety of career exploration, resources, and employer interactions.

The Seguin Youth Career Expo was an interactive and dynamic experience that facilitated a connection between 8th grade students, their Career & Technical Education (CTE) pathways & local companies. A stronger partnership was developed between the Seguin EDC. The short-term goal was to inspire before they choose their CTE pathway in high school. The long-term goal was to connect employers to their future workforce and help students make informed, inspired decisions about their careers after high school, whether they choose a four-year university, community college, or apprenticeship training center.

January 19th and 26th 2024 – Urban Event: Future Ready Summit

- Held at Northeast Lakeview College
- College and Career Readiness
- Goal: 1,000 youth (350 Juniors attended Jan 19th)

The Future Ready Summit is meant to help students in their final years of high school to gather resources to prepare them for life after graduation. Students had the opportunity to learn about career pathways in workshop sessions and meet with employers.

Summary: This item is to provide updates on Youth-Related Initiatives for SEAL and HireAbility.

Summer Earn and Learn (SEAL) provides on-the-job training, offers workplace readiness training, and helps build transferable skills and learning opportunities for students with disabilities.

The Student HireAbility Project provides funding for two positions to serve as resources in the Workforce Development Area to support, expand, and enhance the provision of preemployment transition services to students with disabilities who are in the early phases of preparing for transition to postsecondary education and employment. Outlined goals/strategies of 3-Year Plan aim to coordinate expansion of services for students with disabilities in the 13-county area with Vocational Rehabilitation, working with 50 participating high schools.

Analysis: The SEAL Program for the PY23 concluded in August with 2,515 students placed into employment by 64 employers and 64 worksite locations that offered over 1,500 job openings. The Employer Recognition Ceremony took place on January 12, 2024, with TWC Commissioner, Joe Esparza in attendance. SEAL 2024 employer recruitment has begun with partner meetings commencing on February 1, 2024. The Community Referral Link is now open to the public.

Summary: To provide the Youth Committee with updates to FY24 goals that were presented at the last Youth Committee meeting held on September 22, 2023.

Analysis:

<u>Goal #1: Development of Asset Map – In Progress</u>

In collaboration with the youth contractor, youth program staff will complete asset mapping for rural and urban counties in alignment with WSA's sector-based model and WIOA's 14 Youth Elements. The youth program will implement and maintain strategic partnership development by scheduling recurring monthly meetings for key partners and quarterly meetings with all other partners.

<u>Goal #2: Enhancement of P-TECH Connections – In Progress</u> Youth program will identify talent pipelines, school partners and employers, and create co-enrollment mechanisms to enhance P-TECH connections.

<u>Goal #3: Creation of Youth Model – Executing in February 2024</u>

Youth Program will create a service delivery model by establishing a framework based on Youth Committee board recommendations, identifying key elements, and ongoing communication with key partners.







- Jacquet is looking forward to building a successful career by using his skills and experiences to gain meaningful employment in an industry he is passionate about.




Karleny C.- Bexar/South Floress
